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Objectives:

- Children create an awareness of how they hold everyday items
- They focus on their hands and how they feel
- Children discover that they can have more control when balancing their hold as opposed to gripping with all their might
- Children understand the importance of keeping their hand supple and responsive
- They explore the importance of the thumb when picking up items.

HOW DO YOU HOLD YOUR TOOTHBRUSH?

How do you hold your toothbrush?

Do you hold it scrunched like this?

Imagine if you tried to brush like this?

ROW, ROW, ROW YOUR BOAT EXERCISE NUMBER ONE

Objectives:

- To loosen up arms and shoulders and hands away from the violin
- Feel the natural weight of the arms
- Gradually gain momentum
- Free up the back when swinging arms from side to side

Swing your arms - both of them!

Swing, swing your arms,
Swing them to and fro.
Swing them here and swing them there,
Swing them high and low

(Repeat the bottom line again, singing: Swing from side to side!)



ROW, ROW, ROW YOUR BOAT EXERCISE NUMBER TWO

Objectives:

- To have an awareness of the left arm and shoulders, even when holding the violin
- To keep the shoulder and arm free, loose and supple so that the arm can swing freely under the violin in playing position.

Swing your arm - just under your violin

Swing, swing, swing your arm, Under your violin, If your arm is super loose, Give a giant grin!



ROW, ROW, ROW YOUR BOAT EXERCISE NUMBER THREE

Objectives:


- Keep the shoulders supple and left arm loose under the violin
- For the left arm, hand and thumb to be loose and light to enable sliding up and down the strings

Skate Skate

Skate, skate your hand, Skate it to and fro. Slide it up and slide it down, Slide it up and go... WHOOSH!



Adventurer: Tuck a little figurine into the gap that the bent thumb creates. Take the character for an exciting journey around the room, being careful to keep the thumb gently curved so as not to squash him. Whoosh him up into space and move him from side to side. Make the journey as interesting as possible whilst checking the bow hold. Give the character a mission, for example, to keep the pinky gently curved the whole time.





Feeding time: Find a hand puppet with an enormous mouth. This character LOVES to eat marshmallowy, soft bow holds. Everyone has a go at feeding the puppet their squishy bow holds.

Scarf bowing: Hold a silk scarf gently between the thumb and second finger. Follow a bowing pattern with long flowing movements. The teacher plays the song whilst the children pull and push down bows and up bows with their scarves.



Try not to laugh: Grab a feather and with your student's permission, tickle their left wrist in the gap between the wrist and the instrument. If they laugh they're out.
